FROM THE RECTOR

Dear People of St. Paul's,

Greetings to you in Christ.

I write to you on the eve of Epiphany, also known as Twelfth Night. As the conclusion to the Christmas season, it marks the transition from one mystery to the next. Christmas shows us the mystery the *particular*: how the eternal, immortal, transcendent God assumes a very particular human form: a child born in Bethlehem. And Epiphany will show us the mystery of the *universal*: how a child born in Bethlehem will become the Savior of the nations and the Light of the world.

Not everyone has an appetite for grand mysteries, which may transport the mind but cannot be grasped by sight, sound, touch, taste, or smell. Sometimes we must use our senses to receive a theological insight. Sometimes we need an object—say, for example, a flower. I admit that I do not know much about flowers (I am learning ... slowly). Perhaps the gift of a flower can be enough to experience the mystery of God's grace in a new way, a way that has not before been known.

On the fifth day of Christmas, a group of members (the Brotherhood of St. Andrew) took poinsettias from the church, which were used in our Christmas celebration, and delivered them to the homes of more than 30 other members—particularly those who are on our prayer list, and those who have had a particular difficulty staying connected to the church during this pandemic. It may not have been a gift of *five gold rings*; then again, a gold ring could never smell anywhere near as lovely. Perhaps this simple gift, the gift of a flower, may even have been enough for some to experience the mystery of God's grace in a new and unexpected way.

I pray the same for you—that you would know the grace of God, which is higher than the utmost heights and more inward in the inmost depths. A grace which may be discovered through a theological mystery or by the gift of a flower. The grace which is available to each and every one of us, if we are willing to receive it.

May the peace of Christ—our newborn King, our Star of wonder—be always with you.

DIOPA Soul Care for Caregivers Ministry



Stories from the Archives




On January 6, 1951, a painting of St. Paul's church appeared on the cover of the *Saturday Evening Post*. Done by local artist John Philip Falter (1910-1982),* the painting entitled "Snowy Morning at Church" was reminiscent of Norman Rockwell's work.

According to A History of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, the church was seen as "a sample of a bucolic piece of Americana amidst a strife-filled world during the Cold War." To this end, Falter was "intent on capturing an image of a woman who had the rector's ear, while bottlenecking the rest of the congregation."

* Falter's first Saturday Evening Post cover was published September 1, 1943, and he produced 128 more covers until the format was changed to photographs. Falter also provided illustrations for numerous other publications including Esquire, Good Housekeeping, Cosmopolitan, McCall's, Life Magazine and Look.

BAPTISM

The Sacrament of Holy Baptism is our entrance into the Body of Christ as members of our one Holy Catholic Church.

Through our Baptism we are entitled to participate fully in the life of the church. Baptism is especially appropriate at the Easter Vigil, on the day of Pentecost (50 days after the Easter Vigil), on All Saints Day (November 1) and on the Feast of the Baptism of Our Lord (First Sunday after the Epiphany, January 6). Baptism can also be arranged at other times, in consultation with the priest. Please call the church office at 215.348.5511.

MARRIAGE

Because the decision is such an important one, we at Saint Paul's are very serious about the priestly and canonical responsibilities for presiding at a marriage. To be married at Saint Paul's, each couple must meet the basic requirements established by the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church, The Diocese of Pennsylvania and the customs and practices of this parish.
